

THE SOLEMNITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI AT ST. BONIFACE CHURCH. On June 6, the Feast of Corpus Christi, we found the church decorated with great pomp. It appears our Hispanic community, as a community of faith, thanked God for keeping us safe during the coronavirus pandemic. While our English Masses did not participate in this celebration, this is a reminder of the need for more integration between our two communities. We share more than a church space; much, much more we share our faith beliefs. Are we open to celebrating together?

The Spanish bulletin gives us an idea of just what we missed. "For more than a year, we have had to protect our lives and the lives of other people from this disease, keeping social distance, wearing masks, and washing hands. It has not been easy for many, because some of us have lost family members and friends to this disease. At the same time, we have felt the protection and blessing of God, through the intercession of our Patron Saints: St. Boniface, San Carlos Borromeo, and our Blessed Virgin Mary. For this reason, we have decorated the church and started this celebration with a procession, carrying on our shoulders the images of our patron saints. On this Solemnity we express our faith in the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. On the night of Holy Thursday, Jesus gave his apostles the great mission of celebrating the Eucharist in his memory through the ages: "Do this in memory of me." For us the celebration of the Eucharist is not just a memory or symbolic representation, but an act, in which the priest invokes the Holy Spirit and repeats the words of Jesus at the Last Supper, the bread and wine are transformed into the body and blood of Christ. Consequently, every time we celebrate the Eucharist, Jesus himself becomes present in our midst. At the end of the celebration, after the holy communion, we were unable to go out in procession, as is the custom in our church, instead, we have finished the celebration with a short time of Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and the final blessing. This moment for many was something special, some were moved to tears. Thank God, we come out of this time of pandemic, strengthened as a family, more supportive of each other, more renewed in faith and above all with hope for the future. We also thank God for the priest Peter of Prague and for Pope Urban IV, who have been at the beginning of this devotion."

Let us all pray for unity in our parish and an openness to embracing the customs and the ways our fellow parishioners celebrate the Eucharist and other aspects of

our faith. This concerned parishioner is very sorry I missed this.

"As we celebrate two hundred years of history and beauty, we invite you to look back on all the moments, locations and most importantly, the people who have made the archdiocese what it is today. Two hundred years ago, the newly created Diocese of Cincinnati encompassed Ohio, Michigan and even parts of Wisconsin. Today the archdiocese of Cincinnati radiates Christ to almost half a million Catholics living in the 19 counties of Western and Southwestern Ohio. Through its families, parishes, schools, hospitals, social service agencies and other ministries, the Archdiocese of Cincinnati proclaims the goodness, beauty and truth of the Catholic faith." BEACONS OF LIGHT PASTORAL PLANNING: Parishes are to be Beacons of Light, Families of Parishes, and will be guided by six principles: Here is the first:
