FR. RUDY'S REFLECTION:

Self-giving love is a living reflection of today's Gospel, one of the most recognized and profound passages in all of Scripture: "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." (John 3:16)

On the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross, the Church lifts up the cross not as a symbol of defeat, but as the glorious sign of victory and love. The cross is not merely an instrument of suffering; it is the place where divine love met human sin and transformed it. Jesus, the Son of Man, was lifted up just as Moses lifted the bronze serpent in the desert (John 3:14–15). Just as those who looked upon the bronze serpent were healed, those who gaze upon the crucified Christ with faith are given eternal life.

This is the heart of Catholic faith: that God's love is not abstract. It is sacrificial. God did not send His Son to condemn the world but to save it. This is not the love of one who stands apart, judging from a distance. It is the love of one who enters our brokenness, who carries our wounds, who takes on the weight of our sin to lift us up.

Pope Benedict XVI captured this mystery when he said: "By raising our eyes towards the crucified one, we adore him who came to take upon himself the sin of the world and to give us eternal life. And the Church invites us proudly to lift up this glorious cross so that the world can see the full extent of the love of the crucified one for all, for us men."

The feast we celebrate today invites us not only to venerate the cross but to embody its meaning. We are called to lift high the cross in our lives, not through grand gestures, but through daily acts of faith, mercy, and love.

We might ask ourselves: Do I truly believe that Christ was lifted up for me? And if I believe it, how am I living in response to that love? Am I, too, willing to be lifted up, to pour myself out, for the salvation of others?

In the shadow of the cross, the world sees suffering. But through the eyes of faith, we see salvation. Let us lift our eyes and our lives toward the one who was lifted up for love.
