You may have seen listed in the bulletin that St. Boniface has Holy Hour twice a week— Wednesdays at 8:00 a.m. and Fridays at 1:30 p.m. Have you been hesitant to attend because you don't know what it is all about?

"Holy Hour" is a pious devotional exercise consisting of mental and vocal prayer in the presence of our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament.


Usually, Father Joe or Deacon Jerry leads the prayers which include the Rosary, readings from Scripture, Morning or Evening Prayer, various litanies, and songs. We pray The Divine Praises, and then in Benediction, the presider takes the monstrance containing the Blessed Sacrament and with it makes the sign of the cross over the people.

Holy Hour is not rushed. It is spending some quiet time with our Lord. Praising, thanking, asking. Listening in the peace to hear what God is saying to you.

Jesus said: "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world.... For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink." (Jn 6:51;55) We believe that, in the celebration of the Eucharist, bread and wine *become* the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. You are not receiving a symbol on your lips ... you are receiving the **Real Presence of JESUS**.

#### **#1** Share the joy of children.


When you are spending time with your little ones or your grandchildren, let their happiness infect you, and offer your shared laughter as praise to God.


## Living our Faith


