

Inspiration

Jesus Christ is risen today, Allelina!

Easter is joy. We commemorate Christ's triumph over death and the proof of His divinity. He opened the gates of heaven, giving us the hope of eternal life.

But as life settles back to a more normal routine, how do we continue to feel the joy and hope of Easter? Here are a few suggestions:

 Take time each day to be aware of and thank God for one of the many blessings in your life. Even when nothing seems to go right, or when we experience a loss or disappointment, we are still so richly blessed . . . but it takes effort to be aware of His love. Consider continuing your Lenten penance one day a week until Pentecost. For example, if you gave up TV for Lent, then perhaps "fast" from TV one night of the week throughout the Easter season. This could be a way to continue strengthening our spiritual muscles.



Be conscious of the beauty of spring. A robin building a nest outside your window, a magnolia tree extending arms full of pink blossoms, tender asparagus tips appearing in the garden—these signal renewal. They are reminders of our hope of being born into everlasting life.

Inspiration

In St. Luke's gospel, we read about two of Jesus' disciples walking to Emmaus, a village seven miles from Jerusalem. "And it happened that . . . Jesus himself drew near and walked with them . . ." Let us pray that Jesus be with us on our journeys as we travel around the world on vacation or take a stroll around the neighborhood.

We asked parishioner Fran Klosterman to reminisce about her pilgrimages to Our Lady of the Angels Monastery and the Shrine of the Most Blessed Sacrament in Hanceville, Alabama.

We used to go twice a year. It was a bus trip, but the drive didn't seem that long because we would watch movies and sing songs. When we reached the shrine, there would be Confession and Mass, and a priest would give a spiritual talk. In the afternoon, our group would go to the chapel and have time for private prayer.

The tour of the grounds included the outdoor Stations of the Most Holy Eucharist, a grotto to Our Lady of Lourdes, a chapel honoring Pope St. John Paul II, a grave of an unborn child, and a building with life-size statues of the nativity. And of course we couldn't leave without a trip to the gift shop! Later on, we'd go to the television station. It's hard to believe that Mother Angelica started broadcasting religious programs from a garage back in the early 80's and that effort has now grown to be the worldwide media network of EWTN. It's really amazing.

One time we saw Mother Angelica. She was in a wheelchair and a nurse was with her, but she reached through the cloister grille and touched our hands and blessed us. I'll never forget that special moment.

The shrine is a beautiful and inspiring place. Visiting there reminds us that anything is possible if we trust and have faith.


Living our Faith
