


Dear Brothers and Sisters -


Let us continue to pray for him as he begins his new life and grows in his Catholic faith!

The parking lot extension was paved in time for Easter! Watch for landscaping next!














## SHOULD THE SAN CARLOS HISPANIC COMMUNITY JOIN WITH ST. BONIFACE?

At once, practical questions spring to mind: Will there be Spanish-speaking priests to help Fr. Joe? Will this work financially? At the same time, emotional questions arise: Will worship be enhanced for everyone with this solution? Is this a great opportunity or will both groups see it as an obligation?

In March, three listening sessions were held so that St. Boniface parishioners could ask questions and share initial thoughts. A summary of those sessions was included in the March 31 bulletin. If you did not receive a copy but would like to do so, please call Jenni in the parish office.

To further explore the feasibility of combining the two communities, St. Boniface parishioners were asked to respond to a survey about Mass times and language preferences. Survey results will be tallied and shared in a month or so.

#### **Inspiration**

The Archdiocese of Cincinnati welcomed more than 300 catechumens and about 400 candidates into the Catholic Church at the Holy Saturday Easter Vigil. What joy that all of these people have found the fullness of the faith! If only everyone in the world could be so blessed!



When you read a good book or see a beautiful sunset, it is natural to want to share the experience with others. Likewise, it is natural for us as Catholics to share the Good News of Jesus Christ with everyone. In fact, as baptized Catholics, we are *called* to be witnesses to the world. 
