REFLECTION BY FR. RUDY

It is the Thirty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time, and as we begin to conclude our liturgical year in a few weeks, we are discussing a parable today about the end times in Matthew's Gospel. Jesus described the Parable of the Ten Bridesmaids, five who are wise and five who

are foolish, in a private moment with His disciples on the Mount of Olives. This parable illustrates the coming of the bridegroom, Jesus Christ, to the wedding banquet (the Kingdom of Heaven) and the need for us to live in a manner that anticipates His return. On His arrival, we should always maintain enough oil for our lamps to light the way. And the oil that fuels our lamp is that of our faith going out into the world; the light given to us at Baptism and which continues to live in the light of the cross in our lives. To live in such vigilance means we must do all things to enhance our faith and prepare for His coming, "no matter the day nor the hour."

As Christians, many of us are prepared for and anticipate Christ coming by how we live and what we do on a daily basis. For example, we are thoughtful in our relationships with others; we practice good works such as the spiritual and corporal works of mercy; we make prayer a constant in our lives; and we are life learners in seeking to understand our faith more fully. We realize all things must come to an end and that some day each of us will die; we recognize the final thoughts of the Hail Mary, "Now and at the hour of our death, Amen." All the good works we accomplish here on earth will help us gain entrance to the messianic banquet of heaven. Let us have our lamps always filled to light the way.
