The Transfiguration: A Radiant Revelation of Hope and Identity

My Brothers and Sisters in the Risen Lord,

On this Second Sunday of Lent, the Church invites us to ascend the mountain with Jesus, Peter, James, and John in Luke's Gospel and witness the awe-inspiring event of the Transfiguration. This moment of divine revelation offers us not only a glimpse into Jesus's true identity but also a powerful message for our lives today.
