Remain in My Love

My Brothers and Sisters in the Risen Lord,

In today's world, where division seems to be the norm, Jesus's call to "remain in my love," highlighted in today's Gospel, takes on a profound significance. Because we seem to witness conflicts, strife, and discord daily, Jesus's beautiful words remind us of the power and importance of love, especially *his* love, in overcoming the negative aspects of life that often hurt and worry us.
